Kildeer Resident Barbara Schwietert Elected as Vice Chair of Crow Canyon Archaeological Center Board

(CORTEZ, Colo.)—November 1, 2011—The Crow Canyon Archaeological Center today announced that Kildeer, Ill, resident Barbara Schwietert was elected as vice chair of the Center’s Board of Trustees. Crow Canyon is a not-for-profit research and education organization located in southwestern Colorado.

“Barbara’s input as a business professional and civic leader has been invaluable to Crow Canyon’s board,” said Crow Canyon President and CEO Deborah Gangloff. “We look forward to our continued work with her in the coming years.”

Schwietert has been a member of Crow Canyon in 1990 and was elected to the Board of Trustees in October 2003. She was a member of Crow Canyon’s presidential search committee in 2009 and is a member of the board’s Governmental Affairs Committee.

Schwietert is a human resources consultant and trainer for corporations and not-for-profit organizations, and she regularly facilitates programs for the American Management Association. From 1988 through 1997, she served on the faculty of Lake Forest Graduate School of Management and also taught at De Paul University’s School for New Learning master’s program. From 1993 to 2001, Barbara was mayor of Kildeer, Illinois, and was on the Board of Trustees of the Lake County Municipal League. She represented Lake County mayors in the Chicago Metropolitan Mayors Caucus and served as chairman of the Rt. 53 Corridor Planning Council. She was also on the steering committee of the Foglia YMCA. Barbara received her MBA from Washington University in St. Louis.

The not-for-profit Crow Canyon Archaeological Center, located near Cortez, Colorado, conducts long-term, multidisciplinary research into the ancestral Pueblo Indians of the southwestern United States and provides experiential education programs for adults and children. The Center also collaborates with American Indians on a wide variety of initiatives of mutual interest, including research projects, education curricula, and language- and cultural-preservation programs. Crow Canyon’s Board of Trustees is made up of individuals from across the nation who volunteer their time, talent, and resources to the Center.
